Neglect	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Biannual NSPCC assemblies/workshops which make children aware of how children should be treated and what neglect is (KS1/KS2). • Children are taught about British Values particularly the Rule of Law- The children know that these rules keep British citizens safe. Children know who they can talk to if they might be experiencing this type of abuse: adults at school, Buddy Bear, our pastoral team, Childline etc. • Share Aware Week • Operation Encompass: Expect Respect
Physical abuse	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Biannual NSPCC assemblies/workshops which make children aware of how children should be treated and what physical abuse is. (KS1/KS2). • Children in KS1 onwards learn about the PANTS Rule • Children are taught about British Values particularly the Rule of Law- The children know that these rules keep British citizens safe. Children know who they can talk to if they might be experiencing this type of abuse: adults at school, Buddy Bear, our pastoral team, Childline etc. • Annual Y6 Crucial Crew trip • Operation Encompass: Expect Respect • Share Aware Week (including grooming , age appropriate) • Aspects covered in Life Learning Lessons (PSHE)
Sexual abuse	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Biannual NSPCC assemblies/workshops which make children aware of how children should be treated and what sexual abuse is. (KS2). • Children are taught about the underwear rule.

Emotional abuse	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Biannual NSPCC assemblies/workshops which make children aware of how children should be treated and what emotional abuse is. (KS1/KS2). • Children are taught about British Values particularly the Rule of Law- The children know that these rules keep British citizens safe. Children know who they can talk to if they might be experiencing this type of abuse: adults at school, Buddy Bear, our pastoral team, Childline etc. • Operation Encompass: Expect Respect • Share Aware Week (including grooming , age appropriate) • Aspects covered in Life Learning Lessons (PSHE)
Bullying (Cyberbullying/prejudice bullying)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Buddy Bear- A member of the team, who is dressed as a bear, is a mascot which children can share their worries to/share their achievements. They can speak to him when he visits classrooms or they can email him. His email address is displayed around school and he often visits assemblies to see the children. • Aspects covered in Life Learning Lessons (PSHE) • Assemblies/class discussions linked to Bullying e.g. how to be a good friend. • Computing lessons across the school address E-Safety and cyberbullying. • Annual Safer Internet Day. • Assemblies/class discussions addressing keeping safe and preventing children from experiencing cyberbullying. • All children are aware of the bullying incident book in Miss Cook's office. • Twice a year, a sample of KS1 and KS2 are asked to discuss bullying in pupil voice surveys • Share Aware Week (E-Safety)

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Friendship week (linked to bullying) ● Health Champions (children from a local secondary school) present to children in Year 5 about the importance of staying safe online and E-Safety rules. ● Healthy Lifestyles Week – E-safety is taught during some lessons.
Racist abuse	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Addressed through British Values/Value of the Month assemblies e.g. mutual respect/tolerance of different cultures. ● Aspects covered in Life Learning Lessons (PSHE) ● Children are taught about the importance of respecting all differences and treating everyone equally. ● Children are encouraged to celebrate differences. ● Children are taught to appreciate the range of national, regional, religious and ethnic identities in the United Kingdom. ● British Values Week ● Children show awareness of the lives of people living in other places and times, and of people with different values and customs. ● Annual Black History Month assembly/class work. ● Classrooms have books which cover a range of ethnicities. ● Year 5 cover segregation in their USA topic ● All children are aware of the racist incident book in Miss Cook's office. ● Twice a year, a sample of KS1 and KS2 are asked to discuss this area for the pupil voice surveys.
Discrimination (disabilities)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Addressed through British Values/Value of the Month assemblies e.g. mutual respect/respecting differences. ● Aspects covered in Life Learning Lessons (PSHE) ● Children are taught about the importance of respecting all differences and treating everyone fairly/equally. ● In the Relationships (RSE) curriculum, high quality texts are used to celebrate diversity.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Assemblies - Inspirational visitors e.g. Paralympic/ Invictus Games athlete Nick Beighton • All children are aware of the bullying incident book in Miss Cook's office. • Twice a year, a sample of KS1 and KS2 are asked to discuss this area for the pupil voice survey • British Values Week
Transphobic abuse	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • From Year 5 onwards, Relationship (RSE) sessions address sexual orientation and transgender. High quality resources are used to challenge these stereotypes: books and videos. • Aspects covered in Life Learning Lessons (PSHE) • KS2 - Children are taught about both homophobic and transphobic bullying. They know that is wrong and it is just as serious as other types of bullying e.g. cyberbullying. Homophobic bullying is also addressed in Year 4. LGBT is used, however transgender is not focused on until UKS2. • All children are aware of the bullying incident book in Miss Cook's office. • Twice a year, a sample of KS2 are asked to discuss this area for the pupil voice survey. • Use of Stonewall resources. • Displays around the school, Different Families, Same Love. • British Values Week
Gender based violence/violence against women and girls	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Relationship (RSE) sessions cover challenging stereotypes. High quality resources are used to challenge these stereotypes: books and videos. E.g. Prince Cinders (a male Cinderella). • Aspects covered in Life Learning Lessons (PSHE) • Children are taught all about mutual respect especially with both genders. • Operation Encompass: Expect Respect
Radicalisation/extremist behaviour	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Addressed through assemblies/circle time e.g. Westminster attack. • Children are encouraged to share their beliefs but they know that some people have extreme beliefs which are not right and can result in illegal behaviour. • Twice a year, a sample of KS2 are asked to discuss this area for the pupil voice survey. • Use of Newsround (videos/articles) as its age appropriate.

Child sexual exploitation and trafficking	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Through discussion about the refugee/migrant crisis, upper Key Stage two children have been informed about child trafficking (slavery) and that child refugees are highly vulnerable. • Year 5 and 6 will learn about what the word 'grooming' means and how they can keep themselves safe. • All children take part in a 'Keeping Ourselves Safe' lesson which addresses, in a sensitive way, grooming, E-safety, 'the underwear rule' and what to do if they are worried about their own safety. The word 'grooming' will not be mentioned directly, but addressed through educating children on the signs e.g. not accepting gifts from strangers etc. • Share Aware Week (focus on grooming) • Refugee Crisis (Trafficking)
The impact of new technologies on sexual behaviour e.g. sexting	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Annual production/workshops linked to sexting. • Aspects covered in Life Learning Lessons (PSHE) • As part of the computing/E-safety curriculum, one lesson will be dedicated to address 'sexting'. What is sexting? What are the dangers of sexting? Where can you find advice on sexting? • Y5/6 NSPCC workshop addresses sexting and inappropriate messages. • Y6 performance/workshop delivered annually by an external provision which focuses on 'sexting' and 'cyberbullying'. • Share Aware Week (sexting)
Substance misuse	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Year 5/6 Science unit 'Animals including humans'. Children are taught about the different types of substance misuse: solvent, drugs, alcohol and smoking. • Aspects covered in Life Learning Lessons (PSHE) • Y4: The impact of smoking. • Healthy Lifestyles Week.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Year 6 STAR programme and Crucial Crew.
Gang opportunity/youth violence	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Our Local CSOs visit the school on a regular basis. • Annual Y6 Crucial Crew trip • Local work with the police (Y5/6) • Share Aware Week • British Values Week
Domestic violence	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Biannual NSPCC assemblies/workshops which make children aware of what domestic violence is (KSI/KS2). • Operation Encompass 'Expect Respect' Programme delivered in each year group.
Female genital mutilation	<p>Staff have received up to date documentation about this type of abuse so that they would be able to identify the symptoms if a child experiences it and are clear about how to report it. Children are not taught about FGM until secondary school.</p> <p>Aspects covered in Life Learning Lessons (PSHE)</p>
Forced marriage & Honour based violence	<p>Staff have received up to date documentation about this type of abuse so that they would be able to identify the symptoms if a child experiences it and are clear about how to report it. Children are not taught about this until secondary school.</p> <p>Aspects covered in Life Learning Lessons (PSHE)</p>
Fabricated or induced illness	<p>This is looked at in a sensitive way in KS I when looking at the 'Spoonful of sugar' programme. Only taking medicine when you are actually ill. Only 'you' know if you are poorly or not.</p>
Poor parenting	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • EYFS/KSI role play- looking after babies/dolls. • Value of the month- Caring. Children are taught the importance of caring for one another. • Biannual NSPCC assemblies/workshops which make children aware of how children should be treated. • Addressed through Year 5/6 Relationship lessons. Children learn the importance of the mother staying healthy during the pregnancy and then caring for her baby once she has given birth.
